Probable Suicide.

Mary Ellen Dutcher, a married woman, died at her home four miles southwest of Philomath Saturday afternoon, and the circumstances were such as to demand a coroner's inquest. While the coroner's jury could not obtain evidence enough to return a definite verdict, it is the general belief of those who heard the testimony that her death was a case of suicide or something worse.

The woman died in convulsions and it is believed that the convulsions were the effect of some poison purposely taken or administered. This opinion is strengthened by the knowledge that twelve days ago she took or was given carbolic acid that nearly ended her life. At that time Dr. Newth was sent for and on the road out, met a man who to his inquiry for the direction to the house replied, "You needn't bother going there. That's my wife. Let her sweat it out."

At the inquest the husband spoke of his dead wife in a cruel and insulting manner and testified that he left the house an hour or so before she died, because "My presence was not appreciated and made her fussy." He manifested anything but regret concerning her death and his heartless demeanor aroused the indignation of the jury and the neighbors.

When asked why she should wish to commit suicide, he replied: "She didn't like to live on a ranch. She wanted to be in town where she could fool around buying fancy drygoods and get icecream and soda water every day."

The husband's name is E. B. Butcher. Not only did he manifest the utmost indifference in regard to his wife's tragic death, but he is anxious to get rid of his children and spoke to them Saturday afternoon about sending them to an orphan home. He has bargained for the farm on which he now lives and made a deposit on the purchase price. Mrs. Butcher was buried near the Simonson place Sunday afternoon.—Corvallis Times.
