- In the matter of re-districting the county into election precincts: This matter came on to be considered, the time fixed by law for the re-districting the county into election precincts, and for fixing, or changing the

boundaries of the same; and it appearing to the court that it is necessary to re-district the county for election precincts, in order to have the boundaries of the various road districts to conform to the boundaries of the election precincts, as by law required, and for other reasons, it is therefore ordered that the county be re-districted for election precincts; and it is further ordered that a separate election precinct be created to be known as Morris precinct No. 1.

In the matter of appointment of a justice of the peace for Lobster precinct to fill vacancy: It is ordered by the court that John E. Grier be, and he is hereby appointed justice of the peace for the precinct of Lobster, Lincoln county, Oregon.

Notice to Voters.

All voters in the county are required to register on or before the 15th day of May, 1900, in order to be qualified to vote. Registration may be made before the county clerk or before a notary public or justice of the peace. All naturalized citizens must exhibit their naturalization papers to the registering officer; those unable to sign their name and mark their ballots must have two witnesses present at registration. At least one registration officer in each precinct will be furnished with the proper supplies.
