POLICE COURT.

In the police court during the current year there have been no arrests for the violations of any of the city ordinances. There have been no fines collected, or prisoners committed to the City Jail.

LICENSES.

During the current year one license has been issued for peddlers, showmen, etc., amounting to \$2.50, and two semi-annual liquor licenses have been issued, aggregating \$400.00.
