It was decided that the county convention should be held on Thursday, April 5, 1900, at 10 o'clock a. m., and the primaries on Thursday, March 29, at 1 o'clock p. m.

It was further agreed that no representation by proxy be allowed except by members of the precinct to be represented—that is, a man can represent only his home precinct.

## Republican County Convention.

A Republican county convention for Lincoln county, Oregon, is hereby called to meet in the courthouse in the city of Toledo, Lincoln county, Oregon, on Thursday, April 5, 1900, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for county and precinct offices, and to transact such other business as may come before said convention. The convention will consist of 63 delegates to be chosen by the several precincts, as follows:

The committee recommends that the primaries be held in each precinct on Thursday, March 29, 1900, at 1 o'clock p. m. of said day.

W. L. Maple, of Vancouver, Washington, has decided to establish a creamery at Woodburn. Mr. Maple addressed a public meeting in Woodburn last Saturday afternoon. Farmers to the number of about 200 were present. He offered to build a creamery and make butter at 3 cents a pound; to call for milk at farmers' houses at 10 cents per 100 pounds, and charge 1 cent a pound for cold storage in July and August. He would pay for milk every 30 days. He promised to have a creamery in operation in thirty-five days after assurance that he will receive milk from 200 cows. The result of the meeting was that the milk of over 225 cows was guaranteed. Therefore, the creamery is a certainty. He will hold another meeting at Moniton Tuesday, and at Mount Angel Wednesday. —Salem Statesman.
