Just Politics.

The Newport News is hostile to the congressional candidacy of Senator John Daly of Benton. The News probably desires the return to Washington of that able congressional mountebank, Thomas H. Tongue. The News seems not to have learned that Tongue's four years of salary drawing as a congressman have been four years of jugglery and deception as regards Yaquina bay. Tongue never did, does not now, and never will accomplish anything for Yaquina. He has laughed, laughed heartily and long at the very idea of getting an appropriation for the Yaquina harbor. He regards Yaquina bay and the scheme of improving it as a colossal joke, fit only to be used by congressmen in campaign time. Pseudo statesmen often stand in the light of their own bullwicks, and cast shadows where there ought to be sunlight. Yaquina has often suffered because of the mistakes of her local medicine men, and in the present instance the News statesman seems willing to add another to the long list of errors. Poor old Yaquina's misfortune is that it is easy for people to be fooled. The Times is not interested in the Daly candidacy. Indeed it will fight Mr. Daly if he gets the nomination. It would like, however, to see the republicans nominate, at least, a man.—Corvallis Times.

THE LEADER apologizes for entering the game at this stage. We have no desire to fight the battles of the Newport News, and are not in the least agitated over the candidacy of the Benton county gentleman. But we would like to know how the Corvallis Times learned so much. Was the Times present when Congressman Tongue "laughed, laughed heartily and long at the very idea of getting an appropriation for Yaquina harbor?" The recent report of the engineers showed clearly that there is nothing wrong with Yaquina harbor except an almost total absence of commerce. The report was entirely favorable from every other standpoint. It satisfied every fair-minded man who took time to cool off and calmly consider the question. Congressman Tongue did not kill the commerce of Yaquina harbor and is in no way responsible for the report of the engineers—a report which was entirely truthful, though possibly somewhat more cold-blooded than was necessary. The Corvallis Times is simply an offensive partisan. Its little childish outbursts against Congressman Tongue may be regarded as its first pogroms of the campaign. The engineers' report has thoroughly removed the Yaquina harbor trouble as an argument against Mr. Tongue, and if he is beaten in the convention it will be due to some other cause. The Corvallis Times, by the way, is not expected to support the choice of the convention, whoever he may be.

After one of the most gallant fights on record against overwhelming odds General Grouje was forced to surrender to the British forces under Lord Roberts. It is also reported that Buller's forces have reached Ladysmith and raised the siege. The Boers are not outclassed, but outnumbered. They may prolong the war, but can never win. Their success up to the turning point was phenomenal.

The Porto Rican tariff bill passed the house by a small majority and will probably get through the senate. As a temporary measure it may be all right, but as Porto Rico is part of us, it doesn't seem to be just what the people wanted.

There is no better test by which to determine the usefulness of the individual to the community in which he lives than the appearance and condition of the home where he and his family are domiciled. It may be very humble, a mere cabin, but it will have an expression of neatness, or of nastiness, of thrift, or of indolence, of taste and hopelessness or of brutality and listlessness. And in the expression one can read the character and habits of the dwellers as easily as signs on the mercantile houses are read. A pretty cottage, with flowers peeping out of its windows, beautiful trees embellishing its lawn and a tidy fence about it all is never the property and home of a loafer or a drunkard. One may tour an entire county and from the condition of the several homes and their surroundings give a better judgment and a more correct estimate of the character of the several owners and occupants than can the average traveling phrenologist by feeling of the bumps on their heads. The expression of a human home is a reflex of the character of those who constructed and conserved it.—J. Sterling Morton.
