Farmers' Institute.

The first farmers' institute ever held in Lincoln county began Thursday evening of last week, under the auspices of the Oregon Agricultural college, and was a pronounced success in every particular. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p. m., and Dr. F. M. Carter of Elk City was elected chairman.

Hon. C. B. Crosno made a short and interesting address, extending to those in attendance the welcome of the city. Dr. Withycombe of the Agricultural college responded in an entertaining manner.

Prof. E. R. Lake, also of the college, gave an interesting and valuable address upon the subject of the "Horticultural Outlook." He gave an encouraging talk to the fruit raisers of the county, but we do not think he realizes the possibilities of Lincoln county, particularly in raising apples.

Dr. Withycombe spoke next upon the "Silos as a Factor in Dairying" and his address received the closest attention. He clearly demonstrated that silage crops are the best paying and most dependable crops we can have.

The Rosebrook orchestra discoursed some excellent music between the above addresses. This closed the first session.

The morning session began Friday morning at 9:30. The first address was upon the subject of "Practical Farming" by Hans Olson, a practical farmer, living near Toledo. Mr. Olson spoke to the point and his address was full of merit from start to finish.

Hon. R. A. Bensell gave an interesting and valuable address upon the subject of the "Resources of Lincoln County." Mr. Bensell has given years of study to this question, and his address was listened to with much interest.

"The Babcock Test" was the subject that occupied the balance of the forenoon session. Prof. Kent of the College gave an illustration of the manner of using the Babcock by the use of a small tester, and showed how the dairyman found out his poor cows. He was closely followed by his audience throughout his address, and it was fully appreciated.

The afternoon session was opened by Jas. McDonald of Chitwood, who gave an address on "Bee-Keeping." Mr. McDonald is an expert in this line, and his address was interesting and practical. He clearly demonstrated that the Apis is to be one of the great resources of Lincoln county.

Hon. F. M. Wadsworth followed with an interesting address upon "Care of Cows." A paper upon Poultry raising by I. J. Pepin was also one of the interesting features of the afternoon session.

In the evening session Jas. McDonald spoke upon the subject of "Goat Raising" in the absence of B. F. Grant, to whom was assigned that subject. A paper upon Celery Culture was prepared by D. J. Durbin, but owing to his not being able to attend his paper was sent in and read to the institute. It was one of the valuable papers of the meeting.

The balance of the session was taken up with an interesting stereopticon exhibition of College stock and scenes by Prof. Pernot, which was highly appreciated.

This closed the institute, and while it was not so largely attended as was hoped, still it well repaid the effort put forth.
