THE LEADER is familiar with two other cases of this nature, and in both the cause was charged to poisonous flavoring extracts by reputable physicians. The members of The Ladies Aid society deeply regret the result of their effort to liquidate the debt against the church buildings, but are very thankful that it was no worse.
