No wonder that the dairymen of this district are staying with the business, and more farmers preparing to furnish milk and cream to the creameries.

THE BIG WOODS.

Messrs. D. C. Minto, James Allison, Lon Southwick, George and Fred Waters, Misses M. Southwick, Edith Halley, J. Brown, and Mrs. S. C. Dyer, all of Salem, were among the arrivals last Saturday evening. Each member of the party has secured a quarter section over in the big woods a few miles north of here, and they went in Sunday, under the guidance of Ade Crosno, assisted by Harry Fant and his saddle horses and Fred Stanton with his hack, the latter being left at the Carlson place. They returned Monday in the same manner. The ladies stood the trip like old mountaineers, but the men were pretty tired when they got back to the Vincent House, and the motherly attentions of Mrs. Vincent were greatly appreciated. Among the many who have secured claims in that part of the county recently are twenty-six Salemites. Cabins have been built upon these claims and a good trail made to the locality from C. M. Carlson's place on Depoe slough. This land has been entered and the improvements made through the efforts of Attorney B. F. Jones of Toledo. The benefit to Lincoln county is apparent at a glance. All this land will be a source of considerable revenue as soon as placed on the tax rolls, and the immense lumber business can hardly be estimated. An acre has been found to contain about seventy-five trees, which will make at least 5000 feet of lumber each. A conservative estimate places the lumber of that entire vast timber belt at 40,000 feet per acre, but by some experts this estimate is regarded as too low. These remarks refer more directly to the unsurveyed portion of the timber belt. The facts are that the fine timber lands of Lincoln county are going rapidly, and the person who fails to secure a slice during the next month or six weeks will be shut out. This timber belt alone is bound to make Lincoln county one of the most important points on the Pacific coast. Within a few years numerous large sawmills will be in operation in the county and numerous vessels will be running out of Yaquina bay for foreign and domestic ports laden with the lumber contained in these magnificent trees. This is no pipe dream. It is apparent to any one but a confirmed pessimist. And that brings us back to the Yaquina harbor proposition—but that's another subject.
