After an interesting struggle, the democrats at Kansas City placed Adlai Stevenson on the ticket with Bryan. 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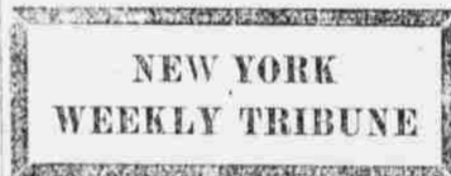
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
