EDDYVILLE, Or., August 4, 1900. We, the jury empaneled to inquire into the cause of the death of Mrs. L. A. S. We further find, upon examination, that the main cords of the bridge were rotten and totally unfit for use.

Careful inquiry by THE LEADER develops the following facts regarding the collapsed bridge: It had a 60-foot span; its stringers or main cords were about fifteen years old, and were first used in a temporary railroad bridge; the upper parts were rebuilt about five years ago, under the direction of Commissioner Bristow. One stringer broke first at the southeast end of the bridge, followed by the parting of the other near the center. The wagon had passed over both points of breakage and was about two-thirds of the way across when the bridge went down. Other particulars of minor importance might be given, but it is unnecessary to say more regarding the sad affair.
