JOHN A. JEFFREY.

John A. Jeffrey of Salem spoke to a good audience at the courthouse last night. Mr. Jeffrey is by long odds the best populist speaker the local democrats have produced during the campaign. While he is rather young, and his oratory is yet of the schoolboy style, he puts up a very plausible argument. He is, in fact, a precocious youth. We have neither time nor space at this late hour to trace his talk from beginning to end. It's strength lay in what he didn't say, and was principally on imperialism. He gloried in Dewey's naval victory at Manila; he thought it was perfectly proper for our troops at a later day to capture the city; he referred to the Filipinos as our allies in that fight. He forgot to tell just how they were our allies; he forgot to tell how the American troops had to force them back to save the city from looting and destruction, which real good time had been promised them by Aguinaldo in one of his characteristic proclamations; he forgot to mention the fact that Aguinaldo had sold out to Spain and was living in luxury at Hong Kong when Dewey received orders to proceed to Manila and destroy or capture the Spanish fleet; he forgot to mention the fact that the Filipinos were the aggressors—that they fired upon our troops before the treaty with Spain was consummated, and while they were yet subjects of Spain; he forgot to state that the Filipinos never gave our government an opportunity to assist them in establishing a government of their own; he forgot to mention a few of the many barbarous acts committed by the Tagals,

under the approval of Aguinaldo, which prove them to be unfit for self-government. He persistently held out the idea that the republican party is no longer in favor of a republican form of government. He even got so reckless as to state that republican newspapers were beginning to advocate a monarchical government. THE LEADER challenges Mr. Jeffrey or any other man to point to a single newspaper that gives expression to such a sentiment. He said the law in North Carolina which disfranchised the illiterate negro also disfranchised the illiterate white man. If he is posted, he knows better. The law—or amended constitution of North Carolina—deprives no white man of the right to vote, and any man who wants proof of this assertion can easily get it. He also made some wild assertions regarding the constitutions of other states, which we haven't space to consider this week. He denied the right of the present administration to take any credit whatever for the present prosperity, and then said it was "borrowed prosperity," anyhow. He failed to make himself clear on this point. If he meant the country is prosperous because of the bonds refunded by the present administration, why didn't he explain why we were not prosperous under the last democratic administration and its big bond issues? He called President McKinley a traitor, ridiculed Roosevelt, and declared at least a dozen "times that they would be turned down hard—or words to that effect—on the 6th of next month. THE LEADER will devote a little more space to Mr. Jeffrey next week. He is a real nice young man and deserves more than passing notice. During his stay in Toledo he was chaperoned by J. W. Parrish, chairman of the populist central committee, who gracefully introduced him to the audience.

The Toledo band furnished excellent music during the evening.
