After two months of hard work, under difficulties, being hampered by a president whose time was too much occupied by other duties, the Ladies Aid society was rewarded Monday by a fair which was a success far beyond all expectations. The total receipts were \$113.97, the names on the autograph quilt bringing \$30.35 of the amount. The quilt sold for \$7.75, Attorney B. F. Jones being the successful bidder. The society cannot find words to express its gratitude to all who so generously patronized and assisted. They are especially grateful to Mr. Wakefield, who donated his services as auctioneer, and kept at work until every article was sold. The society feels that it owes the public an explanation. A great many thought the proceeds were to be used in finishing the church, and it was hoped that a part, at least, might be so expended. It was necessary, however, to pay the following bills, some of them long overdue: Sugar Pine Mill and Fixture Co. of Albany, \$46; material for parsonage, \$40; matting for church, \$4.45; the expenses of the fair were about \$20. The society has earned a much-needed rest, and will meet with Mrs. C. F. Soule next Tuesday afternoon to dispose of all business before taking a vacation. It is earnestly hoped that all members and those who are in way interested in the work will be present on that occasion.
