NEXT TUESDAY.

The voters of the United States will next Tuesday, the 6th inst., again have the privilege of expressing their choice for president and vice president of the Nation. The issues of the campaign have been thoroughly discussed, and but few voters, it is safe to say, are now "on the fence." As they think today, so will they, as a rule, vote next Tuesday. Supporters of the republican standard-bearer will go to the polls backed by a generally satisfactory condition—not an exploded, shallow or dangerous theory. Four years ago the contest was waged squarely on the money question, and "free and unlimited coinage of silver at 16 to 1" was defeated by a tremendous majority. The past four years have proven the wisdom of the people in making that decision. While Mr. Bryan and his chief supporters are unwilling to give the present administration credit for the existing prosperity, or any portion thereof, they have never attempted to explain why disaster does not accompany the republican policy, as they predicted four years ago. The reader is kindly requested to give this point another thought before voting. If the policy of the present administration is all wrong, why isn't the country in the savage embrace of another panic such as prevailed during the last democratic administration? If a policy is wrong, it must be harmful; if it isn't harmful, wherein is it wrong? In predicting all kinds of disaster four years ago should the republican party be successful, Mr. Bryan simply proved that he is neither a sound reasoner nor a reliable political weathercock. A man's political faith should be founded upon what he believes to be best for himself. He should profit by experience. The country is now prosperous, and even those persons who are not willing to give the present administration credit should be unwilling to vote for a change that might result in another period like that from '93 to '96. One thing is certain: The present administration hasn't produced hard times, and thousands who voted for Bryan four years ago have lost faith in him because of the utter failure of his predictions. A good majority of the voters of Lincoln county will refuse to endorse the false prophet.

It has been truthfully remarked that a platform is no stronger than its weakest plank. The free silver plank is still in the democratic platform. Smash it again.

Young Mr. Jeffrey of Salem, in his recent speech in Toledo, mentioned letters from soldiers in the Philippines which he believed were written by Harvey Scott of the Oregonian. THE LEADER can show a letter from a soldier in Luzon which states that himself and comrades would rather have Bryan for a target than the Tagals.
