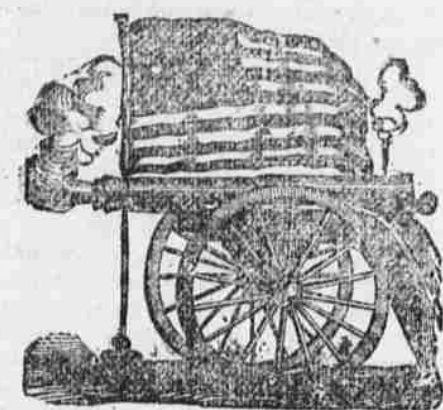

Verdict of 1896.

REPUBLICAN TICKET.

FOR PRESIDENT—
William McKinley
FOR VICE PRESIDENT—
Theodore Roosevelt

The Verdict.

Four years ago, the day after election, Bryan wired McKinley congratulations and said: "The American people have spoken, and their word is law." He was right, but didn't seem to think the American people meant it.

The American people have again spoken, and again endorsed McKinley and the republican platform. The verdict is most decisive. The democratic party can never hope to win with Bryan as a candidate and a Bryanistic platform. As Mr. Bryan has said, "The American people have spoken, and their word is law."

In a few of the eastern states the majorities for the republican candidates are below those of four years ago, and yet far above republican majorities in other years. For example, New York went democratic in 1892, gave McKinley 268,000 plurality in 1896, gave Roosevelt only about 18,000 plurality for governor two years ago, and now gives the republican ticket a plurality of 145,000. This shows that a great many gold democrats who voted with the republicans four years ago this year supported Bryan; but it also shows that thousands of them voted as they did four years ago.

On the other hand, some states show a big increase for McKinley over 1896. Thus Ohio gave him a plurality of 48,497 four years ago and this year makes it 73,000; Indiana increases from 18,000 to 30,000. Every state west of the Missouri river has increased its republican vote over 1896. Kansas, South Dakota, Wyoming, Utah and Washington have dropped from Bryan to McKinley. Colorado gave Bryan a plurality of 134,882 four years ago, which is now reduced to 33,000. Nebraska gave Bryan a plurality of 113,576 four years ago and the result of Tuesday's ballot is in doubt; both sides claim the state. The same is true of Kentucky, but the odds are in favor of Bryan. Four years ago the state gave McKinley a plurality of 281. (We pause here to remark that word just came by wire that Nebraska is republican by 2000.) If this is true McKinley has 292 electoral votes, or a majority of 137, his electoral vote four years ago being 271. Next week we will give vote of those who "also ran."

We almost forgot to state that

Oregon gave the republican ticket a plurality of 14,000, but that, of course, was expected.

In the June election Lincoln county gave Tongue a plurality of 101. McKinley's plurality is 204. We are a factor in the landslide.

Linn county, the only democratic Gibraltar of Oregon, gave Bryan a plurality of about 60. This is a democratic loss of 300 since June.

The country will now settle down and enjoy four more years of good times. Men of every political faith will prosper according to their mental and physical ability, location and the amount of capital invested.

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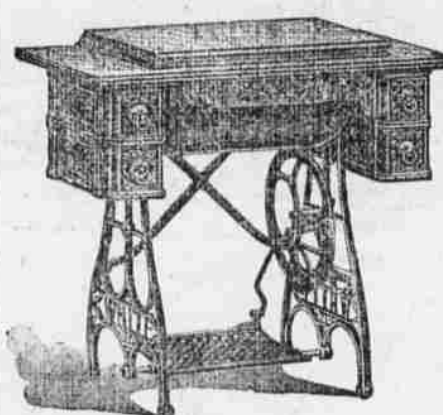
