Thanksgiving Proclamation.

President McKinley has issued the usual Thanksgiving proclamation, setting the date of Thursday, November 29, 1900. The following is the proclamation:

"It has pleased Almighty God to bring our nation in safety and honor through another year. The works of religion and charity have ever been manifest. Our country throughout all its extent, has been blessed with abundant harvests. Labor and the great industries have prospered beyond all precedent. Our commerce has spread all over the world. Our power and influence in the cause of freedom and enlightenment have extended over distant seas and lands. The lives of our official representatives and many of our people in China have been marvelously preserved. We have been generally exempt from pestilence and other great calamities, and even the tragic visitation which overwhelmed the city of Galveston made evident the sentiments of sympathy and Christian charity by virtue of which we are one united people.

"Now, therefore, I, William McKinley President of the United States, do hereby appoint and set apart Thursday, the 29th day of November next, to be observed by all the people of the United States at home or abroad, as a day of thanksgiving and praise to Him who holds the nations in the hollow of his hand. I recommend that they gather in their several places of worship and devoutly give Him thanks for the prosperity where-with he has endowed us, for the valor, devotion and humanity of our armies and navies, and for all His benefits to us as individuals and as a nation; and that they humbly pray for the continuance of his divine favor, for concord and amity with other nations, and for righteousness and peace in all our ways.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"WILLIAM McKINLEY."

McKinley carried 28 states this year with 292 electoral votes, and 23 states with 271 electoral votes four years ago. He gained Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, Wyoming, Utah and Washington and lost Kentucky. Four years ago his popular majority over Bryan was 603,514. This year it is 987,000. So much for statistics. Now Mr. Bryan says he shall continue the fight. How he can have the nerve to do so after looking the above figures squarely in the face is one of the things that no man can understand. Clearly, Mr. Bryan has injured his own cause, and if he still believes what he has been advocating is right, he should go home and give an able and influential man a chance. In expressing a determination to keep right on knocking the stuffing out of 16 to 1 and his other theories, Mr. Bryan is inconsistent, illogical and irrelevant; but that's his business.

Throw away that Bryan button; you'll not need it any more; for Nebraska Bill is walloped harder than he was before. Once again has Billy Bryan got the short end of the count and the People have sat down on Billy's issue "paramount."

Mark Hanna is undoubtedly a b-a-d man. He visited Bryan's home—Lincoln, Neb.—during the campaign, and on election day the city gave a bigger majority against Bryan than it did four years ago. Mark should be withdrawn from circulation.

Some amusing reasons are given by our amiable Bryan contemporaries for Mr. Bryan's defeat. When Mr. Cleveland was beaten by Mr. Harrison in 1888, he gave this reason: "I did not get votes enough." That covers a multitude of explanations which do not explain.
