The state and presidential elections in Oregon were tame affairs, but just wait until the legislature starts in to manufacture a United States senator.

OREGON TIMBER.

Wm. H. Mills, of San Francisco, Cal., land agent of the Central Pacific Railway Company, contributes to The Timberman, under date of October 18, the following opinion regarding the future value of timber lands on the Pacific Coast. Mr. Mills has just recently returned from Paris, where his company made a most comprehensive exhibit of the timber interests of Oregon and California. Mr. Mills says:

"We have raised the price of our timber lands and have made several large sales during the past week. In the presence of a first-class market, which is carrying off the timber at an astonishing rate, there is very little encouragement to advertise. In fact my own opinion is, and that opinion is based upon extensive observation of the condition of the forests of the United States and Europe, that a great market is rising for the timber lands of California and Oregon.

"We succeeded in advertising them most effectively by the exhibit we made in Paris, and some very extensive operations will be transferred from Southern Russia to the Pacific Coast. I also had the pleasure of meeting one of the most extensive manufacturers of lumber in Italy and called his attention effectively to the forests of this country.

"When this market rises, it is going to be very sudden, and I think it is very rapidly approaching. There will be a demand for the timber lands of California, Oregon and Washington, such as we have not before encountered. There are economic reasons for this. They are numerous and operative. They are based upon the actual facts as they exist. The world's supply of

the world has depended upon nature to produce the supply. They plant timber in Germany, but this is no remedy for the present relation of supply and demand. Timber grows very slowly in any country and the forests of Germany do not begin to supply their own country. All the nations are importers. England imported from the United States in 1899 \$22,000,000 of timber, hewn and sawed. This year the amount will rise to \$30,000,000 and will go on increasing. France will be an importer of lumber from America. Already one of the largest concerns in Paris has visited San Francisco as the result of the exhibit we made, and has sent a cargo of red-wood lumber to France."
