LOCAL IN BRIEF.

Attorney B. F. Jones returned last night from Portland, where he appeared before the United States court in defense of Larkey Logan. Mr. Jones secured the assistance of the well-known attorney, M. L. Pipes, and was himself admitted to practice before the United States court. The complaint failed to set forth the fact that Logan is an Indian, and for this reason Judge Bellinger quashed the indictment. Attorney Jones sprung the question of jurisdiction, which was taken under advisement, but a decision will probably not be rendered until next June. Logan is enjoying his freedom and went down to Astoria with his wife on a "pleasure exertion."

Commodore Simon Lentden and his launch Too Few were bringing 25 Chinamen from Nice's Alsea cannery up the bay to Yaquina Wednesday night, when one side of the scow which contained the Celestials and their effects was forced under water by the launch. Twenty of the Boxers made a frantic rush for the launch and almost swamped the little craft, but all were saved. Their baggage, however, worth, we understand, about \$800, was all lost—temporarily, at least. It is reported that some of it floated ashore and was recovered. The Chinamen were on their way to Portland, the Alsea cannery having closed for the season.

At the last meeting Abe Lincoln W. R. C. it was decided not to have a public installation of officers for the coming year, but instead the corps will devote its time and energy to an entertainment for the purpose of raising funds with which to purchase a new flag for Abe Lincoln Post, its flag having been destroyed in the T. P. Fish fire last winter. The date of the entertainment will be announced in the near future. The corps is doing a noble work and last Saturday sent a large box of delicacies, besides a number of rugs and comforters, to the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg.

Council Proceedings.

COUNCIL CHAMBERS, TOLEDO, OR.)
Dec. 3, 1900.)

The Common Council met in regular session. Present: Mayor Vincent, Aldermen Ofstedahl, Kubler, Peterson, Alexander and Gaither. Absent: Alderman Gaar.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Committee on claims reported back claim of Yaquina Bay Mercantile Co. and recommended that it be allowed in full. On motion said claim was allowed in full—viz., \$9.35.

Committee on claims reported it had examined city treasurer's report and found same correct. On motion report was received and placed on file.

On motion rules were suspended, following claims allowed and warrants ordered drawn for same: Yaquina Bay Mercantile Co. for rent for council room from September 1 to January 1, 1900, \$8; C. H. Young, salary as marshal and work on streets for month of November, 1900, \$17.30; O. O. Krogstad, merchandise sold city from October 4 to November 23, 1900, \$7.70; B. F. Swope, fees as recorder for month of November, \$6.60; A. E. Altree, work on streets, \$3.50; C. F. Soule, printing ballots for city election December 4, 1900, \$3.

On motion claim of Yaquina Bay Mercantile Co. of \$5.10 for merchandise sold city from November 8 to 23, 1900, was referred to committee on claims.

On motion the marshal was instructed to raise the crossing on north side of Fifth street crossing Hill street.

Alderman Alexander of the special committee on slot-machine business in the city of Toledo reported that he had examined city ordinances and found none regulating or prohibiting same.

On motion the copy of the proposed city charter as prepared by W. S. Hufford was referred to the committee on ways and means, to be reported on at adjourned meeting Monday, December 10, 1900.

On motion the mayor was instructed to employ an attorney to prosecute the city hall matter and represent the city therein.

On motion council adjourned to meet Monday, December 10, 1900.
