Fish Commissioner Reed has just returned from a trip to the Little White Salmon fish hatchery in the state of Washington, where he went to procure salmon eggs to place in the Siuslaw hatchery, in Southern Oregon. He was successful in his quest, and carried about 1,250,000 eggs from the waters of the Little White Salmon to Yaquina, from which place they will be transported to the Siuslaw hatchery. This hatchery has a capacity of 3,000,000 eggs, but for a time past has been under-stocked. Present indications are that with the recent addition of eggs from the Little Salmon hatchery, the probable output this year will be 2,000,000 small fry.—Portland Telegram.
