MONEY IN SPUDS.

The following, copied from the Lebanon Criticon, indicates that farmers in that vicinity have found something besides wheat that may be turned to money:

"Frank Hall, who lives two miles south of town, last spring planted 15 acres of potatoes, from which he has just completed digging and marketing a little over 4500 bushels. The price received was 30 cents per bushel. The cost of digging, sacking and hauling to town was about 7 or 8 cents per bushel, leaving Mr. Hall a little more than 20 cents for his labor and rent of land. A little figuring shows that Mr. Hall has realized \$900 from 15 acres of potatoes. These are not Mr. Hall's figures, but they are vouched for by a man who helped to dig and sack the potatoes.
