## Merry Christmas!

William Jennings Bryan has declared himself. He is going to "be makin' an editor outin" himself. His paper will be published at his home, Lincoln, Neb., and it will be called The Commoner. As it will stand up for 16 to 1 and the other isms of the Kansas City platform, he might have appropriately christened it The Repeater or The Reiterator. However, The Commoner is bound to be a success if Brother Bryan will "jine" the newspaper trust and assist in keeping up advertising rates. Here's luck.

A big job is visible in the ship subsidy bill and its supporters are marked men. The evident attempt to force the measure through by antagonizing the Nicaragua canal bill is a bulldozing scheme that should not be permitted to win. This sidetracking of popular and important measures in the interest of jobs is an outrage. There are times when thousands of loyal Americans think the United States senate would make a beautiful corpse.

Statistics show that during the past thirty-two years only 271 divorces have been granted in the entire Dominion of Canada. Not a single divorce has been granted in Prince Edward Island, with a population of 100,000, in thirty years. This probably indicates that the Canadians are easily satisfied.

A terrific revolution is raging down in Colombia. The government troops are suffering from the tropical fevers—and heavy orders for quinine have been placed with American drug firms. That old "ill-wind" saw continues to bob up.

The official count places McKinley's total vote in the recent election at 7,212,520, a gain of 200,913 over 1896. Bryan's total vote was 6,350,875, a loss of 158,177 over 1896. McKinley's plurality is 861,645, a gain of 239,090 over 1896.

If we should boycott all society save the total abstainers, the sober remnant would include the worst knaves and the most inenarrable political idiots and social cranks.—Oregonian.

The Indian appropriation bill was completed today by the House committee on Indian affairs. It carries about \$9,000,000. The number of Indian agencies is reduced from 52 to 44, those omitted being Lemhi, Idaho; Neah Pay, Wash.; Nevada, Nev.; Quepaw, Indian Territory; Sac and Fox, Iowa; Siletz, Oregon; Sisseton, South Dakota; Tulalip, Wash. The estimates make no provision for contract Indian schools but \$20,000 is allowed for the Hampton state school, as this is not considered a sectarian school.

In addition \$25,000 for the Salem, Oregon, school for the electric light and steam heating plant, is provided. A section was added to the bill, allowing the Siletz Indians of Oregon to sell or lease a portion of their reservation.

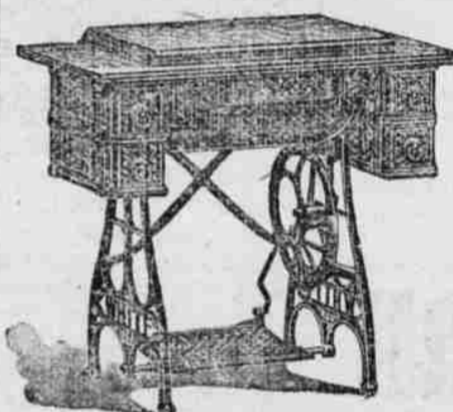
