OBITUARY.

Elmer Rhoades was born in Illinois, December 19, 1824; died December 20, 1900, aged 56 years and 1 day. Mr. Rhoades came to Oregon when he was 3 years old and has since resided here, with the exception of 3 years in Washington. He has lived on the coast for 14 years where he has been respected by a host of friends and neighbors. He leaves a wife and nine children, three of whom are married, to mourn his loss. His death was very sudden. Having celebrated his birthday by the marriage of his daughter Naomi Rhoades to Robert Williams, Mr. Rhoades seemed unusually happy and well all day and in the evening enjoyed himself by having the young people sing for him. He retired with the rest of the family at 1:30, and at 4 o'clock seemed restless and spoke of the wind which blew so hard. A few minutes later his wife, noticing that something was wrong, arose and called the members of the family who gathered immediately, only to look upon the lifeless form of their father. Mr. Rhoades had died without a struggle. Dr. Carter was summoned at once and upon his arrival found that death had resulted from heart trouble. Rev. Elsworth of Newport conducted the funeral services at the house, after which interment took place in the Toledo cemetery. The family has the sympathy of the friends and neighbors of the community.
