Profit in Sheep.

I. J. Pepin of Chitwood, a well-known citizen of this county, writes as follows to the Pacific Homestead, under date of Jan. 7:

I see in the Homestead of Dec. 27 a clipping from the Corvallis Times, showing the profits realized by John Whitaker from a band of 98 ewes of \$6.00 per head, which was a good showing, and I would like to hear from others, as this has a tendency to stimulate one of the greatest industries in this section of Oregon.

I will now give my experience with 44 head of ewes, 2 years old and over from the 44 ewes I raised 60 lambs. I sold 18 head of ewe lambs at \$5 each and sold 21 wether lambs at \$2.86. I have 21 ewe lambs I could have sold at \$5 each. The 44 fleeces averaged \$1.164 each, a total of \$905.88 or a fraction over \$6.95 per head.

I would like to hear the experience of more of the sheep men of the northwest, and their ways of feeding sheep in winter.
