Protect Eastern Oysters, Etc.

An act, now a law by virtue of an emergency clause, protecting all fish sent here in charge of State Biologist.

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for a period of four years from date of passage of this act to buy, sell or take or have in possession any Eastern oysters, Eastern lobsters, or any other food fish or animal which may be sent into the State of Oregon, or which has heretofore been sent into the State for the purpose of introduction or propagation by the United States government under the charge of the State Biologist; provided that this section shall not apply to the taking or having in possession any such fish or animal by said biologist.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of section 1 of this act shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$50, or be imprisoned not less than 5 nor more than 25 days in the county jail. And it shall be the duty of the State Fish Commissioner or Fish Warden, as well as peace officers, to make arrests and institute prosecutions for the violation of this act; and one-half of each fine collected shall be paid to the informer.

Sec. 3. Inasmuch as there is urgent need for the protection of the fishes and animals hereinbefore referred to, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this act shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.
