LOCAL IN BRIEF.

The local teachers' institute held in Toledo last Saturday, while not marked by a large attendance of either pedagogues or visitors, was a success, and created an interest which may result in a larger attendance at future institutes. A number of well-known citizens of the county who always exhibit a laudable interest in the cause of education were present and took an active part in the discussion of the various papers. Dr. F. M. Carter of Elk City and Toledo discoursed learnedly on the subject of "perverted taste," etc., while Hon. C. B. Crosno and Assessor Wadsworth argued logically and entertainingly as to the why of Portland's greatness, etc. From start to finish the institute was instructive and interesting. The evening session, or entertainment, drew a large audience, and was meritorious and enjoyable. A pleasant surprise to many was the Toledo school orchestra composed of Miss Vernie Ross, Leon Rosebrook, Clarence and Oscar Ofstedahl and Rolla Gaar. The numbers given by these young musicians merited and received generous applause and a nice compliment from Prof. Horner. Recitations by Misses Ethel Lemmon and Estella Gannon were among the good features. Fred Ross rendered a vocal solo in his usual winning style, but, unlike the cat, didn't come back, although the audience applauded till its hands were loathe. Prof. J. B. Horner of the Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis was down for an address on "English Literature," but apologized and substituted a paper on Robert Burns, which was really a fine eulogy of the famous Scotch plowboy poet. Professor Horner is working earnestly for the summer school at Newport this season and believes it will outclass any summer school on the Pacific coast. His enthusiasm is contagious. Everybody is with him.

Scott Bozorth, the wide-awake manager of the Pacific Homestead, and C. Boeschen, chief cook at the insane asylum, both of Salem, came in last Friday evening and next day went to their homesteads up Depot, accompanied by Attorney B. F. Jones. They returned to Salem Monday.

EDUCATION—RECREATION.

The Oregonian of Sunday, April 14, contains a very interesting illustrated article from the pen of Prof. J. B. Horner of the Oregon Agricultural college, descriptive of Yaquina bay, Newport and tributary attractions. Lack of space prevents the reproduction of the entire article, but the following extract will probably be of more interest to local readers than any other part thereof:

Among the many inviting attractions and the most valuable opportunities presented is the Summer normal school and seaside lecture course to be held in the splendid auditorium near the beach. Here will be afforded advantages for study and recreation under the direction of those who stand foremost in ranks of the educational interests of the state. Here one can enjoy the companionship of the cultured, refined and educated. In this school the student can learn the secrets of the mysteries and beauties that surround him.

Popular lectures on history, art, science, philosophy, culture, music and religion will be given by most eminent scholars and speakers, free or at a nominal rate. Round table talks and discussion on the current questions of the day will command the attention of every one. For the teachers there will be provided by educators of wide reputation a thorough course of modern methods in teaching; and such as are desirous of passing the Fall teachers' examinations may do so at this place by gaining permission from their respective school superintendents. In short, this will be a first-class normal school conducted at a noted watering place at a nominal cost to the teacher, thus saving the enormous expense and valuable time of going elsewhere to improve himself in his profession.

Short excursions will be planned to explore the wonders of the beach and to visit the several places of marvelous interest. These excursions will be under the instruction of those familiar with the coast and competent guides and teachers. One can not only see and handle the jelly-fish, the sea-urchin, the star-fish, the mussel, and the sea moss, but learn what secrets Nature has hidden in the lives and habits of these curious creatures of the sea. He can not only look upon the pearly agate and beautiful shell he may chance to pick up on the beach, but can be taught the history of their formation and the story of the ages they tell about the winds and the waves of old ocean.
