THE BOARD OF TRADE.

The Lincoln County Board of Trade held its regular monthly session in Toledo council chamber Monday night. The attendance was not as large as usual, but it was an interesting meeting.

The secretary read a letter from Hon. Wallis Nash of Nashville expressing his regrets that he could not be present, and offering "the following suggestions, having for their object the diffusion through the county of the advantages of advertising done by the Board of Trade:

"There should be opened by the secretary, under the direction of the Board of Trade, a register of the properties for sale or exchange in Lincoln county. Any land holder should be entitled to have his property there listed, under the description furnished by him, and for which the Board of Trade must not be held responsible. A fee of 50 cents might be charged for each entry, the description not exceeding, say 3 lines; 15¢ if longer.

"Either in the same or a similar book should be entered the particulars of all applications for purchase of property in Lincoln county, or applications for entering into negotiations to that end—name, address, date of letter, short particulars. This last register to be open to all members of the Board of Trade and to all persons who have paid their entry fee for registering their property for sale. Sales or exchanges of listed property should be reported by the secretary at each meeting of the Board. The newspapers should be requested to insert a standing notice that such a register of properties and of intending purchasers was kept by the Board of Trade, and newcomers should be invited to inspect it at any time."

The suggestions of Mr. Nash were unanimously adopted. Citizens of the county who have property for sale may now have the same listed by complying with the requirements therein set forth.

President Jones stated that during a recent visit to Portland he was informed by a gentleman who is interested in the development of Oregon that he receives many inquiries regarding Lincoln county's resources, particularly the great timber section.

Secretary Krogstad receives stacks of letters of inquiry from all over the country, some of which will be published in THE LEADER from time to time for the benefit of all concerned.

The board adjourned to meet Monday evening, Feb. 17. Remember the date.

AN ORDINANCE

to regulate the salaries and fees of the subordinate officers of the city of Toledo.

Be it ordained by the common council of the city of Toledo.

Section 1—That the Recorder shall receive the sum of six dollars (\$6.00) per month as compensation for his services or duties to the council, and in case of arrest he shall assess the costs, being entitled to the same fees as a justice of the peace for Oregon.

Sec. 2—That the marshal shall receive the sum of twenty dollars (\$20.00) per month and shall receive fees only in case of making arrests or serving subpoenas on witnesses in cases before the Recorder, which fees shall be the same as received by a constable of Oregon, and shall be collected by the Recorder as provided by ordinance for collection of fines.

Sec. 3—That the Treasurer shall receive 2 per cent on the amount of warrants paid and cancelled by said Treasurer, and this shall be his compensation.

Sec. 4—That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its publication and posting.

AN ORDINANCE

to prohibit the carrying of concealed weapons within the limits of the city of Toledo and to fix the punishment therefor.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Toledo, in the State of Oregon, that:

Section 1—It shall be unlawful for any person to carry concealed about his person in any manner whatever, any revolver, pistol, or other fire-arm, or any knife (other than an ordinary pocket knife), or any dirk or dagger, slungshot or metal knuckles, or any instrument by the use of which injury could be inflicted upon the person or property of any other person.

Sec. 2—Any person violating any of the provisions of Section 1 of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in the Recorder's Court shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars nor more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail not less than five days nor more than twenty-five days, or by both fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

Sec. 3—This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its publication, as required by law.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Council Chambers, Toledo, Or.
February 5, 1902.

The common council met in regular session. Present—Mayor Van Cleve, Aldermen Van Cleve, Gaither Wells and Parker; absent—Aldermen Holm and Starr.

Minutes of last meeting read and corrected.

Petition from Rite Dedrick asking for re-survey of 4th street. Referred to committee on streets.

Report of committee on claims. Committee recommended that claim of Earl Nye be not allowed. Claim of B. F. Swope for \$5.60 referred back to council for further consideration.

Claim of F. W. Carson for \$5 for fixtures for street lamps. Referred to committee on claims.

The following claims were allowed under suspension of the rules: C. H. Young, salary as marshal for January and work on street lamps, 18 50; G. L. McCaulou, putting up lamps, \$2; O. O. Krogstad, supplies, \$3.50; G. R. Schenck & Co., 55 cents; Yaquina Post, printing election tickets, \$3.50.

Claim of B. F. Swope taken up for further consideration and allowed.

Alderman Gaither introduced an ordinance to prohibit the carrying of concealed weapons in the city of Toledo, which was read three times and passed under suspension of the rules, Aldermen Gaither and Van Cleve voting "aye" and Wells and Parker "nay." The mayor cast the deciding "aye" vote. The ordinance was ordered published at the usual price.

Alderman VanCleve introduced an ordinance to fix the salaries of the subordinate officers of the city of Toledo. Ordinance read three times and passed under suspension of the rules by a unanimous vote. It was also ordered published.

Bonds of recorder and marshal examined and accepted.

The committee on waterworks stated that it was not ready to report and asked for further time, which was granted.

Council adjourned.
