Protestations of Friendship.

There is occasion for Americans to be amused. Incident to Prince Henry's coming visit to this country, all Europe is indulging in protestations of friendship. As if recognizing the elevation of the United States to the position of a world power by the war with Spain, European countries hasten to show that during that conflict they each prevented intervention. Reserving a certain amount of credit for France, M. Hanotaux declares that Russia's declination to join a demand for a peaceful solution of the difficulty withheld Europe from a display of force against the United States. As if realizing that such credit given to Russia would not comport with former representations made by the British Foreign office, Lord Cranbourn, England's under-secretary for foreign affairs, rises in Parliament to explain that it was Great Britain's refusal to join in "subsequent proposals"—proposals subsequent to the joint note passed by Lord Pauncefote to president McKinley—which determined the course of Europe. And so the protestations of friendship go merrily on.

But there is one thing which Europe in protesting friendship must look more carefully to, and that is agreement in those little details regarding propositions to interfere during the Spanish-American war. Either M. Hanotaux is right and Lord Cranbourn is wrong, or M. Hanotaux is wrong and Lord Cranbourn is right. Perhaps neither is wholly right or wholly wrong. It may be possible there are some details which will be much more interesting on this side of the Atlantic, and which will be disclosed unless European nations get together and agree on their story. They may think that we Americans will be flattered by the spectacle of nation after nation tumbling over each other in a mad desire to gain our good opinion, but they mistake us entirely, for we have the idea, erroneously perhaps, that we can very well get along without intimate relations with any European Power. Certain events have transpired since the Spanish-American war which tend to confirm us in this idea.

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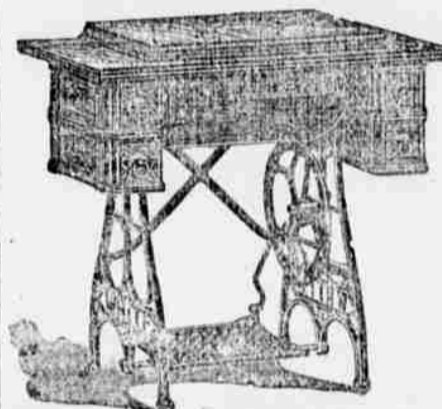
