PROCEEDINGS.

In the matter of the assessment of the Stewart & Center creamery plant. Reduced from \$400, to \$250.

In the matter of the assessment of Emma B. Thompson, lots 3 and 4 in block 16, Nye and Thompson's addition to Newport. Raised to \$50 each.

In the matter of the assessment of Krogstad and Olson, east ½ of lot 1, west ½ lot 5 in block 2, Olson's 2d addition to Newport. Reduced from \$200 to \$150.
