From the evidence so far given to the public it does not seem that Mr. Barber has overstepped his authority, and should this be the final decision, there will be another wad of needless cost stacked up against the county. Public sentiment appears to be practically unanimous in favor of Mr. Barber.

Cecile Bethers.

We reproduce the following from the Oregon Gazetteer, published at Salem at the Oregon School for the Deaf:

It is with feelings of the deepest grief that we chronicle the death of our dear little friend Cecile Bethers, who went to her heavenly home on Friday, Dec. 19th, at 8:30 a. m., aged 11 years, 1 mo., 9 days.

She came promptly at the opening of school in the fall and by her sweet and sunny disposition at once won the love of all who had not already learned to love her the year before.

Early in November she with seven other girls contracted whooping cough. All seemed to have a mild form of the disease and none of them missed more than one day at a time from school until Thanksgiving Day, when all were at dinner and we were congratulating ourselves on the general health of the school. But after that Cecile did not regain her strength as the others did, and on Dec. 5th her mother came and took her home. She grew rapidly worse and on the 19th she passed away. The sad news reached the school on the 22nd, too late for us to take any part in the funeral, which occurred at Toledo, on the 21st. The news cast a gloom over the whole institution.

Among the new pupils that came to us in the fall of 1901 was a little girl about ten years of age. She had red cheeks, brown hair and deep blue eyes which showed in them intelligence and truth. She was one of the brightest of our little class of oral pupils and was so good and happy all the time that the other children became very fond of her. She learned speech and lipreading very readily and many times would say that she meant to try hard to learn, so that she could read her papa's books and talk as her parents did.

Little Cecile has left us and we miss her very, very much, but we are comforted by the thought that she has gone to that happy land, where "the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the tongue of the dumb shall sing and the ears of the deaf shall be unstopped."

Doings of the City's New Dads At the Special Session.

Council Chamber, Toledo, Or., January 19, 1903.

Council met in special session. Present—Councilmen, Peterson, Hall, Wells, Dick, Sturdevant, Recorder C. E. Hawkins and Recorder-elect, O. O. Krogstad. Absent—Councilman Anderson and Mayor Van Cleve. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Bond of Recorder-elect Krogstad being approved he was thereupon sworn in, and assumed his duties as recorder. The following bills were allowed: F. W. Carson, blacksmith work, \$1 05; George A. Landreth, percentage as city treasurer, \$26.95; C. E. Hawkins salary as clerk, \$4; O. O. Krogstad, lamp supplies \$8.55. Resignation of George A. Landreth as city treasurer accepted and G. L. Gray was appointed city treasurer to fill the vacancy. Report handed in by committee on the investigation of the absence from the city and of several meetings of the council of Mayor Van Cleve. The report recommended that the office may be declared vacant; but that action be deferred until next regular meeting in February. On motion a committee of two, including the recorder, be appointed by the Mayor to draft an ordinance providing for the tax levy for the coming year. A. T. Peterson appointed on the above committee. Upon motion council adjourned to meet Saturday, Jan. 24, 1903.
