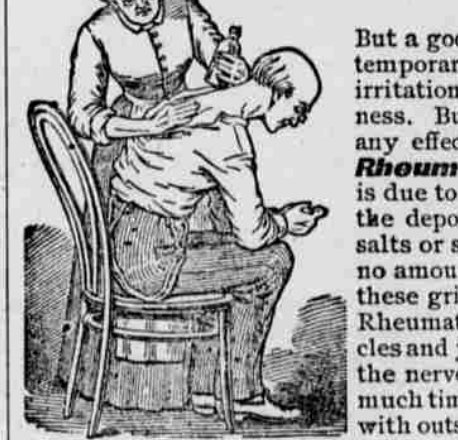
Life and Death.
