J. M. Shirley of Eddyville was in our city Tuesday. Last October Mr. Shirley sustained a fracture of the cap of the left elbow, and of late the injury has been giving him considerable trouble; and his mission in Toledo was to obtain medical aid. Dr. Wetmore performed a very successful operation—removing over a pint of serum from a sac that had formed between the bones. There is every hope of Mr. Shirley recovering the full use of his arm.

Toledo was the scene of an accident last Tuesday afternoon, by which George, the 14-year-old son of F. W. Canfield was very seriously injured. George and his cousin, Harvey Winsor, were sitting by a stove in the latter's home and Harvey was handling a gun which was accidentally discharged, and the contents struck George, wounding him in several places. Harvey ran for assistance and Dr. Wetmore was summoned. Upon examination he found severe wounds in the left thigh and below the knee; but the most dangerous one was caused by two shot which had apparently glanced from the stove, and passing into the scrotum severed the spermatic artery. Owing to the dangerous nature of the latter wound, Dr. Wetmore deemed it best to apply a compress bandage to stop the arterial flow rather than resort to the more delicate operation of taking up and tying the artery—after which he dressed the wounds in the leg. The hemorrhages were soon stopped and the unfortunate boy was made as comfortable as the nature of the case would admit. Up to the hour of going to press there has been but little change in his condition for the better. Dr. Wetmore considers the chances about even.

An ordinance to levy a tax upon the taxable property within the limits of the city of Toledo, Ore., for the general fund of said city.

Be it ordained by the common council of the city of Toledo:

SEC. 1.—That a tax of five mills on the dollar, upon the assessed valuation of the property within the limits of the city of Toledo be and is hereby levied for the general fund of said city for the year 1903.

SEC. 2.—That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its publication or posting.
