## COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

### of the City Dads in Regular Session.

Council Chamber, Toledo, Ore., May 4, 1903.

Council met in regular session. Mayor Sturdevant, Councilmen Peterson, Wells, Hall, Plumlee and Krogstad. Absent—Councilmen Hick and Anderson.

Minutes of last regular meeting read and approved.

Application presented by Glass & Jacobson to be granted license to sell beer for six months. Accompanying was a bond in the sum of \$500. Aggoner and M. N. Anderson supported which was upon motion, approved license granted.

Application presented by L. M. Starr and asking for opening and improvement of a street from intersection of Street, and the same, upon motion, referred to committee on streets.

Designation of Jas. Anderson from Elk City, upon motion; accepted. Committee appointed to interview Water Co. discharged.

On motion City Water Co., ordered to remove within 5 days dirt left on course of water main on Hill

On motion, recorder ordered to notify Olson to settle with city for grade and construction of sidewalk in front of his property on Street or the collection of the would be enforced in a legal proceeding.

On motion, recorder ordered to C. & E. R. R. Co. and property on both sides of 4th street and including railroad right of Hill street to finish grade and thereon a coating of gravel 8 feet and 6 inches thick, the same to be let within 60 days.

On motion, property owners along sides of Graham street between 7th and 8th streets be ordered to complete grade on said street, and that committee on streets be requested after the establishing of the

On motion, recorder was ordered to advertise for bids for the grading of section of Hill and 9th streets, to be in and opened at next meeting.

On motion, council adjourned to again June 10, 1903, at usual hour.

## HOW IT WENT.

### Lincoln County Gives Hermann a Handsome Majority.

The election Monday caused no excitement and but very little interest in Toledo, and this is probably true of other precincts in the county. The lone exception in Toledo was Al Waugh. His Democratic reputation and \$15 were at stake, and there was something doing in his vicinity all day. By hard work he scraped together 45 votes for Reames and saved both his reputation and long green. He is under deep and everlasting obligations to the citizens of Newport who swelled the Democratic vote in Toledo.

Only about 30 per cent of the entire vote of the county was polled, some precincts falling off 40 per cent.
