Siletz Siftings.

Prof. Gates and Mrs. Arthur Bensell have been very busy for some time completing and forwarding the exhibits for the Boston Indian Institute in July. Prof. Gates' class work in pyrography consists of a nut bowl 12 inches in diameter—a perfect and beautiful design; A unique hat rack design; The pipe of peace in a white circular background flanked on each side by dragons; the honeycomb and vine work add much to its value; two paper knives of vine maple, with smooth burnt work, are exquisitely wrought. Edward Curl, Lee and Eddie Evans and Arthur Bell justly feel proud of their work. The class work in Nature study, Malinda Collins and Belle White, A Violet. First grade—Language, Martha Adams: "I have a little garden. Every boy and girl in my class has a garden. I have radishes and cabbages in mine. They are growing big. Some have peas and lettuce in their gardens. I hoe, rake and weed my garden." Second grade, by Arthur Bell: "A lot of cattle is called a herd. We have a herd of 19 cattle at Siletz training school. Cows are good for their milk. We milk 14 cows now. Six boys milk, etc." First grade, by Cora Pike, a weaving design; Third grade, a mechanical drawing design for a tile floor, by Ed Curl; Geography of Oregon, Cecile Clay; Physiology, by Guy Chapman; Arithmetic, Susie Lafayette. The embroidery work of Mrs. Bensell's class consists of American Beauty, a rose center piece; pansy turnover collar, by Malinda Collins; Ethel Logan, red California poppy center piece; Susie Lafayette, violet and Mexican drawn work center piece; Josephine Washington, Hinton lace doily in yellow; Edna Cook, a sailor suit of blue duck for a two-year-old girl; Sarah Wilbur, a stylish apron; Irene Lane, a tasseled curtain; A California poppy picture frame by the Rebecca Art Club. The work is exquisite and has been viewed by many people, and many are the expressions of commendation for the teachers and scholars.

Mrs. Wolvelski committed suicide Tuesday night at her home near the Stemple place down the river. She succeeded in severing the artery of her left arm with a razor, and although help arrived soon they were unable to check the flow of blood and she died the same day.
