Who Says County Fair?

To the people of Lincoln county:

It is up to you now to say whether you want a county fair or not this fall. We cannot get up a successful fair without the co-operation and assistance of ranchers and townpeople in general. The fairs in the past, although successful, have placed too much burden on a few. As big an undertaking as a county fair cannot very well be pushed to a successful termination by a few individuals, let them be ever so energetic and self-sacrificing. A successful county fair indicates that we are up with the times and that we have a definite end in view—and that end is to improve upon the past. Everyone should aim to produce something in the line of farm products or in the line of one's handicraft to merit a place at our county fair. A healthy rivalry of this kind tends to inculcate progressive ideas and marks a progressive people.

It is for you people of Lincoln county to say whether you will be progressive or not by the attitude you show towards this county fair.

The co-operation shown at our past fairs has been limited and confined to about the same exhibitors both times. This we desire to overcome, and must, therefore, insist upon a more general co-operation. It is your fair; it is for your benefit, and it devolves upon you to make it a paying investment. One good feature about these fairs is that they cost no great amount of cash. They do, of course, cost some time and personal effort, without which elements they cannot be run.

It is not right nor fair that the work of preparation and management should fall upon a few willing individuals.

My object with this article is to arouse a more general interest, and for those so interested to speak their mind through the public press or by direct communication with the secretary, Jay W. Dunn, or the undersigned. Please let us hear from you.

The highest price paid for Oregon mohair this season was 45 cents—several lots bringing 42 and 43 cents. This speaks well for the goat breeding industry in Oregon, and our Lincoln County ranchers should be cognizant of the fact that a fortune lies within their grasp if they will improve their opportunity and give mohair growing a fair trial. Our county is especially adapted to the rearing of goats—mountainous regions being their natural element. Covered, as our higher elevations are, with abundant shrubbery of a high nutritive ratio and of a nature well suited to the appetite of its goat-hip, they will do well on the range all the year around with but little extra feed or care during the winter months. Oregon mohair has a high commercial value in the eastern markets. One firm recently placed a shipment from Oregon on a parallel with the best Persian product and paid a premium above the market value for the same. Give the goat a chance, and don't be afraid to let the world know of the success that will crown your efforts to bring Lincoln County to the front in every thing—be it what it may. Develop her natural resources and we will have the richest county in Oregon.
