THE GLORIOUS FOURTH.

A Hi Yu Skookum Celebration At Siletz—A Few Siftings.

At sun rise Saturday morning heavy firing awakened the citizens of Siletz to a realization that the Fourth of July was at hand. By ten o'clock everything was ready and the march commenced to the beautiful grove a quarter of a mile east of the agency. On the stand were gathered the choir, composed mostly of Indian girls and Mr. Gates as organist, Major McKoin chairman, O. B. DeLaurier, B. F. Swope, Rev. E. H. Bryant, Dr. Wetmore, Mesdames Swope and Bryant and Plug Uglies. Following the first song Major McKoin addressed the large audience for ten minutes in a way that brought forth much applause from his hearers. Hon. B. F. Swope's remarks were thoroughly appreciated. John Adams spoke to his people in Jargon and we have heard nothing but the highest praise for O. B. DeLaurier, who read the Declaration of Independence, and of the singing and speakers. The grounds had been well decorated and every convenience possible provided for the people. Groups were formed and dinner prepared for all. The multitude of good things to eat that were on the ground that day. Roast beef was sliced and passed around to all who desired it. There has been no more orderly or quiet or social fourth held on this reservation, and to Major McKoin and his co-workers much credit is due for the enjoyment afforded. The athletics were held on the grounds adjoining the grove in the afternoon. Bruce Butler won in the 100-yard race; in the 50-yard race, Bruce Butler was barred, and Eddie Curl, one of the school boys, won after running a tie race with George Newberry three times. Following was a 50-yard foot race for ladies. We refrain from mentioning any names but one of the most estimable of our ladies won. Ethel Logan won in the girls 50-yard race. The pole vaulting was something new for Siletz and after a very exciting contest Bruce Butler won with Eddie Curl second. The hop-step-and-jump premium went to Bruce Butler—distance 40 feet. Egg race for girls, Ethel Logan was victorious. Joe Dick captured the prize for being the most comically dressed among the Plug Uglies. There were several contestants in the baby show. The honorable judges, composed of O. E. Gates, Walter Hall and E. T. Hamar, awarded the first prize to Mrs. Scott Lane's child and second prize to Mrs. Wolyerton Orton's baby. The fourth closed with the usual feather dance and social dancing and a 12 o'clock supper at St. German's hall. Abe Logan, as marshal, was everywhere directing and helping. We enjoyed the visit of our neighbors from Chitwood, Newport, Toledo and neighboring towns.
