ject, "The Public School Teacher." The

listening to, no matter how well edu-
cated they were. Professor Horner is
recognized as one of the leading edu-
cators in the state as well as one of the
greatest educational speakers.

and closing by giving his methods of
history teaching.

Miss Gans were well received and
greatly appreciated. Dr. Carter and
Captain Clark were present and did
their part with other of the Elk City
people to make the institute a grand
success. Mrs. Rose Schenck's recita-
tion, "Fishing," was greeted with an
enthusiastic encore.

The next institute will be held at
Waldport some time in August.
