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In Memoriam.

John T. Hanlon died at the Good Sa-
maritan Hospital in Portland, Oregon,
July 8, 1903.

Mr. Hanlon's death was due to
asthma superinduced by exposure and
hardship during the war of the Rebel-
lion. He was a member of the G. A.
R. and had gone to attend the Grand
Encampment at the time of his death.

Comrade Hanlon was born in Louis-
ville, Kentucky, July 19, 1844 and en-
listed in Company A, First Mississippi
Cavalry Volunteers, in the fall of 1861
and served throughout the war. Mr.
Hanlon was engaged in some of the
noted battles of the war, among them
were Gettysburg, Cold Harbor and
Shiloh. He received a severe sabre
wound in the head which fractured the
skull and caused constant pain and
nervous irritation up to the time of his
death.

Mr. Hanlon was married in Illinois,
November 10, 1866, to Miss Rebecca J.
Moore, and with his family came to
Oregon in 1892 and located on Beaver
creek in this county, where he has
since resided. Four children were
born to Mr. and Mrs. Hanlon, viz: W.
E. Hanlon of Yaquina; Mrs. Mary
Ryan, Mrs. Hattie Lyons and J. T.
Hanlon, Jr., all of Beaver creek.

The remains of the deceased were
interred in the beautiful Fern Prairie
cemetery near Seal Rocks, July 12th.
The funeral was attended by a large
number of friends and neighbors.
General T. J. Thorp and A. W. Weber
paid glowing tributes to the memory
of the deceased both as a soldier and a
neighbor.

The old veteran has answered his
last roll call and has gone to join his
comrades beyond the mystic river.

"On fame's eternal camping ground,
Their silent tents are spread,
And glory guards with solemn round,
The bivouac of the dead."
