Since the Cleveland and Bryan bubbles have burst in the democratic pipes the party in eastern sections of the United States, especially in the anthracite regions, are quietly booming Judge George Gray for the presidency. Some few enthusiasts claim that he is a man of such strength and magnetic influence that "if nominated" he will "probably be elected." "If's" and "probabilities" have long been the hairs in the democratic soup, and represent the frail underpinning of the democratic platform. The American people of today are following facts—and recognize that there are no "if's" or "probabilities" about the result of the next campaign. Theodore Roosevelt is the choice of the people and is invincible. He will lead the Republican party on to victory. There will be no repetition of the period of want and misery that prevailed among our working people during the last democratic administration. They learned then that "if and probabilities" were poor providers, clogging the wheels of industry, and throwing wide the gates of commerce to the paupers of Europe who staked their penny against a plenty—flooding our markets with the product of serf labor and forcing thousands of our free-born citizens to soup houses established by charity, or organizing them into clamoring hordes like Coxe's followers—casting a blot upon the fair name of our Republic that the succeeding years of prosperity have, in a measure, effaced. 'Tis but the slimy root of anarchy sprouting in our midst that desires a change.

Thomas A. Edison, the "Wizard of Menlo park" has abandoned his experiments with the X-ray and his attempts in making a fluorescent lamp. Having discovered that operators in experimenting with the X-rays, are in danger of losing their lives. Clarence Dally, an assistant of the great scientist, has lost his left arm and practically the use of his right hand by his experiments. and in too frequently placing his hands between the fluorescent and the X-ray tube, the mysterious power of the rays causing atrophy of the blood vessels nourishing the tissues and developing cancerous conditions which necessitated the amputation of the arm. The New York World, in a recent issue, quotes Mr. Edison as follows: "My researches, I may as well tell you now that I have abandoned them, were in the direction of making a fluorescent lamp. I obtained results which brought me each day nearer the object of my desire. I found a crystal that was fluorescing 12,000 times, and I thought I had my lamp. Then came the question of practical use. I could make the lamp all right, but when I did so I found that it would kill everybody who would use it continuously." "No, I do not want to know any more about X-rays. In the hands of experimental operators they are a valuable adjunct to surgery, locating as they do objects concealed from view, making, for instance, the operation of appendicitis almost sure. But they are dangerous, deadly, in the hands of the inexperienced, or even in the hands of the man who is using them continuously for experiment. There are two pretty good object lessons of fact to be found in the Oranges."

Where Racing will be Good.

Visitors to the Oregon state fair this fall will witness the greatest racing ever seen in the state. Salem business men have raised a purse of \$2000 for 2:17 pacers to be raced for on Salem Day, which has 30 horses entered. These horses are from the best stables in Oregon. Washington, Idaho, California and Montana, and it is expected at least twenty of them will start, furnishing the largest field of high class horses ever seen on a track on the Pacific coast. Portland, too, has contributed a purse of \$2000 for 2:20 trotters to be raced for on Portland Day. This race has 27 horses entered, of which most of them will start, making two of the greatest racing events ever held this side the Rocky mountains. If you are fond of seeing high-class racing, don't miss these two events.
