We're Theorists.

The direct election of Senators is wanted only by theorists in politics who equally disregard practical experience. The present method was adopted for practical reasons. It represents the equality as such of the indestructible states which compose this indissoluble Union. Senators are elected by the people now to represent this and other valuable principles. To elect them by direct vote for the man instead of by direct vote for principles would lower senatorial contests into strifes of personalities. In time it would certainly result in destroying the equality of the states as such. The next step would be to base senatorial representation upon population instead of upon statehood.

That this foolish proposal should come from members of a political party that for nearly half a century has been unable to win continuous public confidence in its capacity for national government is a fact not without its significance. It should be rejected out of hand because it is flying in the face of common sense.—Chicago Inter Ocean.

The above will prove a mild surprise to many readers of the Inter Ocean, one of the great newspapers of the country. The comment was called forth by a bill for the election of United States Senators by direct vote introduced by a Democratic congressman, Mr. Sulzer of New York. As Senator Mitchell of Oregon has or will introduce a similar bill in the Senate, the idea does not come altogether "from members of a political party that for nearly half a century has been unable to win continuous public confidence," etc. According to the Inter Ocean, an overwhelming majority of the voters of the country are "theorists in politics who equally disregard practical experience"; they are also "flying in the face of common sense." And just read the great organ's reason for advocating a continuance of the present system? "To elect them by direct vote for the man instead of by direct vote for principles would lower senatorial contests into strifes for personalities." Isn't that rich? What are senatorial contests now? Nearly every state in the Union is familiar with the damaging effects of senatorial deadlocks. Important legislation is neglected or defeated and graft measures become laws because the senatorial contest overshadows all other business and dictates the action of state lawmakers even on measures of vast importance, where their duties seem clear. On this question THE LEADER is willing to "fly in the face of common sense" and be classed as a "theorist" by the Inter Ocean and perhaps a majority of the United States Senators who could not possibly be elected under the system proposed.

One Mr. Heims owns an eight-acre orchard eight miles south of Ashland, and cleared \$6,000 as a result of this year's crop. 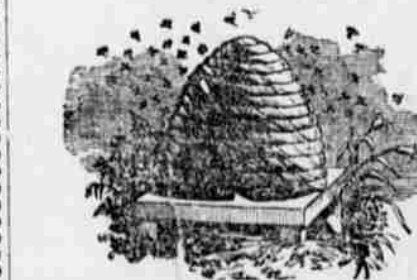
