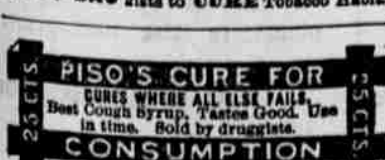

In fact, Mr. Cannon takes good naturedly the stories told of him. They may not be true, but he never denies them, as he says there are so few really good stories that it is a pity ever to spoil one. An anecdote of this class, almost manifestly untrue, is told in Mr. Cannon's home, Danville, Ill. He went to prayer meeting one evening and, having had a "long session" with some friends the night before, was naturally rather drowsy. In a short time he was fast asleep; he even snored. The minister was irritated, but finally determined to let Mr. Cannon feel the humiliation of his position. So without warning he said in a loud voice:

"Will Brother Cannon lead in prayer?" Cannon never moved, and the minister repeated in a louder tone, "Will Brother Cannon lead?" Cannon looked up stupidly. "Tain't my lead," he grunted. "I dealt last." And then he relapsed into slumber.

It would take a book to hold all the stories told of Mr. Cannon. This of itself indicates that he is good-natured in private life, though he frankly admits that he likes to have his own way. Mr. Boutelle, of Maine, on one occasion, angered by Mr. Cannon's objections, said, "There are some men, Mr. Speaker, who would break up a funeral if they were not selected to drive the hearse." But Cannon never winces when the laugh is turned against him. He merely tries harder to have things different next time, and, what is more, he generally succeeds.

As chairman for many years of the appropriations committee Mr. Cannon's influence on legislation has been greater than that of any man in Congress save the Speaker. In appearance Mr. Cannon is uncouth. He gives the impression of being "as tough as a pine knot." He detests being referred to as "the watchdog of the treasury." He declares that he only listens to the barking of the numerous self-appointed "watch dogs" and then investigates for the purpose of learning whether or not their growlings are worthy of investigation. That Mr. Cannon is sturdily honest even his detractors have never denied, and he is a concededly able parliamentarian and forceful debater, though, technically perhaps, rather a poor speaker.
