Free and Careless Life.

The country editor has little patience with the city editor who loves to dwell upon the free and careless life of the independent farmer, in plowing time, seeding time, or shucking time.

It is a source of perennial delight to the city writer to lay hold on an agricultural theme—to talk eloquently of the dewy or frosty morning in the country, the noon that comes with a healthy appetite, the evening that means natural repose for the honest toiler, the dreamless, restful night while the rain is pattering on the roof and making the golden corn grow.

"Shucking the corn," in particular, is a phase of life on the farm that thrills the soul of the city writer who lives in the steam-heated flat. "Shucking the corn!" exclaims the editor of the Britt (Ia.) Tribune. "What a grand theme!" We've been there. Out in the frosty morning with the air so bracing that our toes felt each brace, grab an ear covered with frost, yank it loose from the stalk and toss it into the box! How our heart swelled with pride as it struck the sideboard with a resounding whack, and we thought of the store debt, and the price that the steer that ate the corn would fetch in the Chicago market. Doubled up like a jackknife until noon, when we went in to spend the "nooning" shoveling the corn into the crib and nothing to do after dinner but to swell up with pride and shuck another load to unload after dark, and then milk the cows, feed the hogs, take care of the horses and chop wood until breakfast was ready.

The Britt (Ia.) Tribune man apparently is what the late Artemus Ward would have called a "sarcastic cuss." Just listen to this:

Oh, for the free and careless life farmer with the golden ears hitting the bang board on the corn wagon during the daylight, and the consciousness of a "well-spent life" during the hours of darkness. The hand that yanks the corn ears is the hand that rules the world, and he don't strike. He simply works twenty-three hours a day to feed the son of a gun who works two hours a month to get money enough to go on a strike during the balance of the year. Hurrah for the farmers!

The city editor's view of shucking the corn may be all wrong. And yet it is optimistic. It embraces the fuller hope. It helps to stimulate us all to loftier endeavor. The country editor's view may be truer to life. But it is pessimistic, discouraging, depressing.

It is a bad thing sometimes for a man whose business it is to educate the public up to the higher ideals to know too much about his subject. And worse still to tell all he knows about it. The city editor in this case is the more useful citizen. He doesn't know much about shucking the corn, but what he doesn't know is satisfying and tranquilizing to the average city man, who is looking forward hopefully to the time when he can lead the free and careless life of an agriculturist.—Inter Ocean.
