MAYOR COLLINS.

He Is Now Looming Up for Governor of Massachusetts.

The victory of Gen. Patrick A. Collins for Mayor of Boston has brought him forward as a candidate for Governor of Massachusetts.

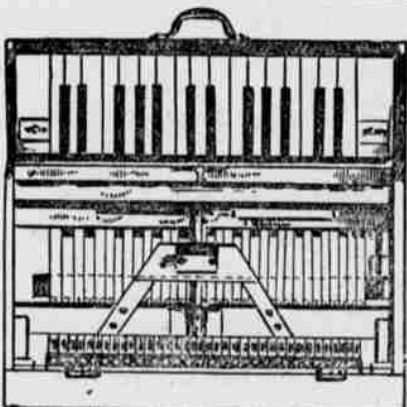


His majority of 27,000 in Boston has never been equaled for a candidate before. Mayor Collins' majority is not only the greatest for Mayor but the largest ever massed in Boston, the nearest approach to it being the one assembled for McKinley in 1896, which was 21,899. Three years ago McKinley carried the city by 7,000.

Mayor Collins gets his title of general from being the United States Consul General at London from 1893 to 1897. He is the only Irish-American who has occupied so prominent a place in the consular service of this country. He was born in Ireland in 1844, taken by his widowed mother to Chelsea, Mass., four years after, and when old enough, acted as office boy to a Boston lawyer. At 13 he went to Ohio and worked as a laborer. He returned to Boston, learned to be an upholsterer, then a lawyer, putting in two years at Harvard Law School. He began a successful practice as soon as admitted, sprang into popularity with a bound and his eloquence as a public speaker added to his reputation. He has served in the Massachusetts Legislature several terms and was three times elected to Congress. In the Democratic National Convention of 1892 he made a masterly speech in favor of Grover Cleveland which added much to his reputation. In 1899 he ran for Mayor of Boston the first time, but was defeated by Thomas N. Hart, owing to divisions in the party. In 1901, these having been healed, he was elected over Hart, by 18,839 majority, the largest ever given for Mayor in that city up to that time.

DEVICE FOR PIANO PLAYERS.

When the flute, violin or cornet player starts on a trip away from home for a long or short period of time, it is not a difficult matter for him to carry his favorite instrument with him, in order that he may keep up his practice while he is absent. Even those who do not play know how important it is for a musician to keep up his practice, and are aware in how short a time the player can lose his skill in producing sweet music on

the instrument with which he is familiar. Especially is this true of the piano player, a large portion of whose skill lies in the constant use of his hands in practicing finger exercises. While the players of small instruments may be fortunate enough to find similar ones away from home, the piano player is not apt to be so fortunate, owing to the higher price of his instrument. As he cannot take the piano with him, he necessarily is more liable to suffer than any other class of players. But there has just been patented a finger exercising device for piano players, which, while it is not guaranteed to make as sweet music as the large instrument, will surely prevent the stiffening up of the fingers through lack of practice on the keys. This invention can be carried in a case no larger than the dress suit bag, and consists of a mechanical arrangement of the keys whereby each one, on being struck, gives out a click to aid the player in regulating his time. The tension of the keys can be adjusted to correspond with those of the instrument on which the player is in the habit of performing.
