The woman who accepts wrinkles as she does gray hairs, as the footprints of time which tenderly record not only the passing years but the incidents and experiences of life, gains in the estimation of people whose good opinion counts for something by contrast with the woman who dyes or bleaches her hair and submits to painful "treatment" for the eradication of lines which time and experiences have written upon her face. The most uninteresting face in the world is that of an old person without lines either of youth or age; the most interesting face is that which time has touched gently leaving thereon tender tracings.—Oregonian.

The states of Oklahoma and Arizona are created in a bill which has been completed by the Republican members of the subcommittee of the House Committee on Territories. The Democratic members of this subcommittee have been placed in possession of the bill, and after they have considered it for a few days a meeting of the full subcommittee will be held. The two states mentioned are composed of Oklahoma and Indian Territory as "Oklahoma" and Arizona and New Mexico as "Arizona." The admission of the latter two territories is not delayed by any restriction of law, but may be effected as soon as a convention can be called to form a state constitution. The bill provides, however, that Oklahoma and the Indian Territory shall not be admitted as a state until the year 1906. By this time all the Indian lands will have been allotted. The problem of providing proper revenue for schools, growing out of the fact that the Indian lands of Oklahoma and Indian Territory have been allotted in severalty to the Indians under a law which makes them non-taxable, has been met by an appropriation of \$5,000,000 out of the treasury. This money is to be used to establish and maintain schools. The principal of this fund may be used to the extent necessary, the balance being placed in deposit at 3 per cent to the credit of the state for the maintenance of the schools established.

The Primary Law.

Following in the footsteps of the Michigan State League committee in charge of direct primary nominations, the executive committee of the Oregon League is issuing documents of an educational character and leaving nothing undone to have electors thoroughly posted when they go to the polls in June.

In the first place it must be understood that the proposed law is to be voted on under the initiative June 6. The result of the vote then cast will settle the question as to whether the people desire candidates for office nominated directly at the primaries or whether they desire to continue the old system of party conventions.

The law, as proposed, is a species of reform which has been tested in Minnesota, and is said to have produced good results. Quite a number of prominent Oregonians are interested in the movement, yet political parties are remaining silent on the subject at present, but are expected to take a stand in opposition to the proposed law before the campaign is over.

W. S. U'Ren of Oregon City is secretary of the League, and it is from his office pamphlets are being issued. In one of his missives he says:

"The Oregon bill has been carefully prepared. Among the lawyers who have either taken active part in drawing it or have approved it after careful consideration, are Judge T. A. McBride, C. E. S. Wood, E. Bronaugh, S. B. Huston, Charles E. Lockwood, Judge Alfred F. Sears, Thomas G. Greene, R. W. Montague, V. R. Hyde, F. T. Griffith, R. C. Wright, C. B. Moores and W. S. U'ren. It is one more step in the effort to abolish the rule of the 'boss' and establish the rule of the people."

Governor La Follette of Wisconsin is one of the leading advocates of direct nominations, and his speeches on the subject are used to advance the reasons why Oregon should place the law on the statute books by a direct vote of the people. In one instance Governor La Follette is quoted as saying:

"The result and the only result sought by a primary election is to give to every man an equal voice in the election of all candidates; to lodge in the people the absolute right to say who their candidates for office shall be; to root out forever the power of the political boss to control the selection of officials through the manipulation of caucuses and conventions. A primary election should provide the same safeguards for nominating candidates as for electing them. It should fix the day, name the hour, use the same polling places, have the same election officers, provide the Australian ballot, containing the names of all candidates to be voted for upon at the election. It should be an election possessing all the legal sanctions of an election."

All of those features are embodied in the proposed law to be voted upon June 6, and it is up to the people of Oregon to adopt or reject it.

The Successful Kicker.

There is no better way to judge the character of a man than by the way he kicks. In every business of any magnitude, where the work must be done by many hands, some errors will occur. And in rectifying these errors there is an excellent opportunity to get a few glimpses at human nature. The narrow-minded man always kicks as if the mistake in his case had been made intentionally, with the object of cheating him or discriminating against him. He often makes foolish threats, indulges in some unnecessary talk about honesty, etc. The broad man treats a mistake as a mistake and politely asks that it be corrected. It is not necessary to say that if anybody has to wait awhile for a correction it is not this man. His politeness and good nature are appreciated and his affairs are nearly always made satisfactory without any trouble.
