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That Toledo Bluejacket.

MANILA, P. I., March 4, 1904.

Dear Folks, One and All:

Your very welcome letter was received by me today also the violin string and the papers. I was very glad to hear from home. It took your letter just 44 days to reach me. The mail service between San Francisco and Manila is very poor, even at Chee Foo we got our mail every two weeks regular but here it only comes once a month and sometimes not that often, which makes it quite a long time to wait.

We finished big gun target practice last week and have run into port so we are now lying at Cavite. We got a 48-hours liberty as soon as the mud hook was down, the first liberty from the ship for three months, and I never want and more liberty in this place. Manila is the nearest to Chee Foo for filth and dirt to anything I ever saw. They have dirty, narrow streets paved with cobble stones a foot high, and little dirty shacks for buildings. I don't think there is one building in this city as fine as some of the stores in Toledo, and Manila is a city of 250,000 population. One thing they have got that is fancy and that is prices. You pay \$5 for a pleasant smile. There is, I think, 60,000 Chinamen in the city and about 100,000 natives, so you can imagine how things are. I have come to the conclusion that Manila is as big a fake as Dewey's victory over the Spanish row boats in Manila bay. I managed to stay 24 hours out of 48 on shore, which was enough for me, and then I made tracks for the ship. There is nothing at all to see here except the Walled City, the bridge of Spain and the Bellbird Prison. These are the only places of interest, and they are not of much interest to the casual observer, although I suppose they were interesting to the natives at times when the Spanish got after them.

Cavite is seven miles from Manila across the bay, and to get there one has to take the ferry from here. Cavite is a small town, but is, I believe, far ahead of Manila. About a half mile from Cavite is a native village known as San Royae. It is composed entirely of native huts made from bamboo. It is quite a sight to go through the place just to see how they build their houses. We are to lay here sixteen days more on account of some damage that was done to the after turret in this target practice, then we are to go to Hong Kong with the Kentucky. She will go in dry dock, then to New York and then home. The Juan de Cuba leaves for home tomorrow. She is a gunboat in our navy, but was a first class cruiser in the Spanish fleet against Dewey and is about the size of the T. M. Richardson. She is to go to the St. Louis Fair, but to my way of thinking she is a poor sample of Dewey's victory.

I suppose we will soon be going north now. After we leave Hong Kong we will go either to Shanghai or Chee Foo. We cannot go to Japan—that is, and get any liberty—on account of the Jap-Russia war. I don't have any idea how they will come out. We don't hear much about it. We know there is war between the two countries but that is about all. You know more about the war than we do. All the United States cruisers have gone the seat of war to protect American property or interests. From what war news we get Russia seems to be getting the worst of it. You want to know if I was not sorry I left Bremerton. No, I am not. I would not sell the experience and the sights I have seen if I never had any more book learning. I am in the navy now. You could not call Bremerton the navy, although that is the starting point. I like going to sea. There is always something new to see and it is a healthy life, although the climate here is very bad. Well, I have done pretty well writing, so I am going to quit, for I do not want to tire you out. Write long letters and send me lots of LEADERS and Reporters, for I like to see what hay is selling at once in a while, also to see when Dave Williams comes to town. Well, I must close, hoping to hear from home soon, I am as ever, S. W. ROSEBROOK, U. S. S. Wisconsin.

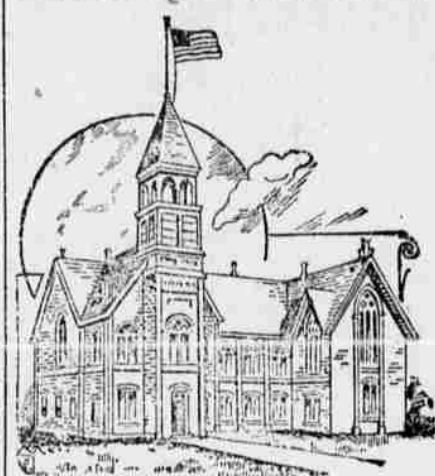
