Hermann Wins.

Congressman Binger Hermann was renominated at Salem Wednesday by acclamation, his strongest opponent, Hon. L. T. Harris of Lane, not permitting his name to go before the convention. The rest will be just as easy for Mr. Hermann.

The Facts in the Case.

As indicated by the semi-annual statement of County Clerk Wade, the total indebtedness of Lincoln county at the beginning of the present month was \$53,396.63, with resources of \$16,325. Perhaps \$2000 of these resources will go to pay interest on outstanding warrants, making the actual indebtedness \$59,071.63—instead of \$60,000 or \$70,000, as has been unblushingly circulated by the Yaquina Bay Knocker and other dishonest calamity howlers. The semi-annual statement last November showed a total indebtedness of \$52,340.80, with resources of \$6,880.81—an actual indebtedness of \$45,460.08—or \$8,408.45 more than the present debt. Let it be remembered that these resources are gilt-edged—no inflation. As stated in the report, \$11,325 of the amount is cash. The property bid in by the county at tax sales is not even estimated as a part of the resources, although all are agreed that it amounts to something. This is certainly a good showing, and should in a measure quiet the fears of our citizens who have been taught to believe the county debt is piling up every day.

The Newport Newsman unloaded some of its venom at Commissioner Stanton last week. Mr. Stanton has lived in this part of the world nearly 40 years and has the utmost confidence and respect of a host of old friends and neighbors. He was defeated for renomination, it is true, and this is just about what will happen to any man who attempts to succeed himself as county commissioner. It is well understood that when an official act of a commissioner or county court gives satisfaction in one quarter it almost invariably causes dissatisfaction in another, with the result that there is a strong demand for a change every two years. Mr. Stanton was defeated, and took it like a man—not like a mugwump. He bears a good reputation, and one who does not is hardly qualified to pose as his critic.

The contest for the Democratic Presidential nomination seems to have narrowed down to Judge Parker and Willie Hearst, with the former having all the better of it. Judge Parker is a pretty able man for a Democrat and would make a much better race than Hearst, although neither could go much outside of New York City and the solid south.

A Russian battleship struck a mine near the entrance to Port Arthur harbor Wednesday and went down with 800 men. This is a sad incident—and is not a rumor. The Russians are very careless with their own weapons.

While the appropriation made by Congress for the Lewis and Clark Fair isn't as large as it should have been, it should not be forgotten that it requires less to make a good showing in Oregon than it does in Missouri.

"It is rumored" that the Russians and Japs have at last had a mixup or two on the banks of the Yalu, in which the Japs were whipped. There are other rumors, but this is the most interesting.

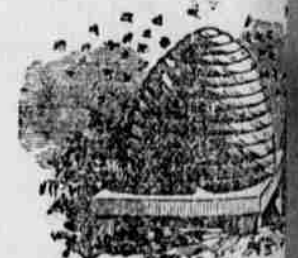
