Grist of Business Transacted at the Adjourned Term.

TOLEDO, OR., May 2, 1904.

Commissioners' Court for Lincoln County in adjourned session. Present—Hon. C. M. Brown, Judge; Hon. F. M. Stanton and Hon. George King, Commissioners; Ira Wade, County Clerk; J. H. Ross, Sheriff.

In the matter of the petition of J C Fletcher to change polling place in Morris precinct. Petition granted and the schoolhouse between Boulder and Crowley fords on Salmon river designated as the polling place.

In the matter of polling places in the various election precincts. It is hereby ordered that polling places be designated as follows:

In the matter of the claim of F M Stanton, Commissioner, per diem and mileage, \$10.80. Allowed.

In the matter of the claim of George King, Commissioner, per diem and mileage, \$19.40. Allowed.

In the matter of the Chitwood bridge Commissioner Stanton authorized to inspect the bridge and on his acceptance for clerk to draw warrant.

There being no further business, it is ordered that Court adjourn until its next regular term, unless sooner convened by order of the County Judge.

Council Proceedings.

Council Chamber, Toledo, Or., May 2, 1904.

Common Council of the city of Toledo met in regular session. Present—Mayor Vincent, Councilmen Van Cleve, Arnold, Rosebrook, Turnidge and Recorder Krogstad. Absent—Councilmen Dick and Anderson.

Minutes of last regular session read and approved.

Moved by Councilman Van Cleve and seconded by Councilman Rosebrook that the two local papers be requested to publish, for the good of the public, Ordinance No. 16, relating to boys climbing onto railroad trains passing through the city. Carried.

Committee on streets reported that obstruction across road leading to city wharf was on private property. Upon motion report was accepted.

Recorder reported that lot proposition of Mrs. M. A. Day had been withdrawn.

Moved by Councilman Van Cleve and seconded by Councilman Arnold that order made at last session relative to recorder issuing warrant to Mrs. Day for lot be canceled. Carried.

Moved by Councilman Van Cleve and seconded by Councilman Turnidge that city purchase east one-half of lot 6 in block 6, Graham's Fifth addition to Toledo, from Gus Olson at his offer of \$50, providing he will execute a good and sufficient warranty deed to same. Carried.

Committee on streets reported new hydrant ordered placed at corner of Graham and First street in front of residence of C. B. Crosno.

Boy and Train Ordinance.

Manager Edwin Stone one day last called THE LEADER's attention to an ordinance recently passed by the city council of Corvallis, designed to prevent boys climbing upon moving trains within the city limits. Mr. Stone expressed the hope that Toledo would adopt a similar ordinance. We spoke to Councilman Anderson on the subject, with the result of bringing to light an ordinance designated as No. 16, passed by the city council of Toledo April 6, 1896. We reproduce sections 1 and 2 thereof:

That it shall be unlawful for any boy under the age of 18, in the city of Toledo, to board any passenger, freight or other railroad train, unless it be for the intention of riding on said train as a passenger thereof, and not for the purpose of stealing a ride, or from idle curiosity.

Any person or persons found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and when guilty and convicted before the City Recorder of the city of Toledo, shall be fined in the sum of five dollars for the first offense and ten dollars for the second.

While this is not as strong as the Corvallis ordinance, it will do very well if enforced—as it should be. The Corvallis ordinance also prescribes heavy penalties for the trainmen who permit boys to climb upon the cars when in motion or remain upon them after they have started and then jump off. The enforcement of ordinance No. 16 may result in some of our nice little boys living to a ripe old age who have for some time been regarded as candidates for an early grave.
