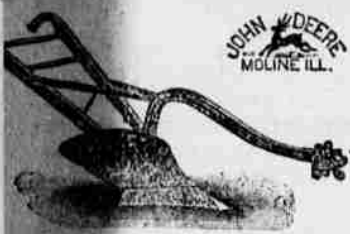

More wheat and lumber were shipped
from Portland last month than from
any other Pacific Coast port. Although
