Oregon at St. Louis.

During the first month of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, over one million people went through the turnstile gates into the fair grounds. Of this great number, half were paid admissions, while the other half were allowed entrance on passes.

The grounds are rapidly nearing completion, and each day marks some improvement in the general character of the fair. All the bare spots have been leveled off, and where for two years nothing has grown, grass is sprouting up through the soil.

There has been much criticism on the management for allowing such a large number of passes to be issued, but as there are a great many workmen employed on the grounds who have to be provided with tickets, the passholding army will continue to swell the gate figures for some time to come. Just as fast as possible, however, the gangs of workmen are being reduced, and the officers promise that the pass attendance for June will be much smaller than that of May, while the paid admission will be larger. Thus the net admission for the two months will remain about the same.

Over four thousand of this million attendance have visited the Oregon building and signed the register, while several thousand more have passed through the structure without putting their names down. All expressed themselves as greatly pleased with the showing made by the western states, particularly with Oregon and Washington.

Among the notables who have crossed the threshold of the Oregon building is Governor Bailey of Kansas, who visited the house last week in company with his wife and Commissioner Morrow of Kansas. He was shown all over the cabin, and after taking careful note of everything, finally said:

"Well, I have visited every state building on the grounds, and none has pleased me so much as this one. It is unique and so different from any other state mansion and at the same time it is so attractive that it is a pleasure to see it."

Governor Bailey's opinion is the same as the majority of those who visit the structure and understand its meaning. It is built of logs and is intended to represent the fort built by Lewis and Clark on Clatsop plains, one hundred years ago, the first building built by an American citizen on the Pacific coast.

While a great many visitors are ignorant of the great journey of the two intrepid explorers, yet there are many who have not only made themselves familiar with Lewis and Clark, but also know all about the 1905 fair and Portland. A great deal of literature is being distributed by Superintendent Wehrung.

Oregon's building is not in an out of the way place, but on the contrary, stands on one of the highest spots on the grounds, and is on the main road, way from the Palace of Fine Arts to the Government building, a thoroughfare that is always thronged. Oregon is attracting attention at St. Louis, and promises to have a large delegation from Old Mizzou in 1905.
