Favorite Japanese Card Game.

A favorite card game of the Japanese
 is played as follows: One hundred well
 known proverbs are selected, each di-
 vided into two parts and each part
 printed on a separate card. The host
 of the evening has the hundred first
 halves, which he reads aloud, one by
 one, the hundred second halves are
 dealt to the other players, who place
 their hands face upward on the "tata-
 mi," or thick mat of rice straw, on
 which they sit. As the first half of
 any proverb is read the holder of the
 second half throws it out, or to be

it unnoticed among his neighbor's
 cards seizes it and gives him one of
 his own. The player who is first "out"
 wins. It is a very simple game, but it
 affords great entertainment to the
 players, for the quicksighted and keen
 witted are constantly seizing the cards
 of their duller and slower neighbors,
 and this leads to much laughter and
 many good natured sarcasms.—West-
