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A Statesman's Faith.

Here is something worth reading—a few of the many striking utterances of the late Senator Hoar:

"I have no faith in fatalism, in destiny, in blind force. I believe in God, the living God. I believe in the American people, who do not bow the neck or bend the knee to them. I believe that the God who created this world has ordained that his children may work out their own salvation, and that his nations may work out their own salvation by obedience to his laws, without any dictation or coercion from any other. I believe that liberty, good government, free institutions, cannot be given by any one people to any other, but must be wrought out for each by itself, slowly, painfully, in the process of years or centuries, as the oak adds ring to ring. I believe that a republic is greater than an empire. I believe that the moral law and the golden rule are for nations as well as for individuals. I believe in George Washington, not in Napoleon Bonaparte; in the Whigs of the Revolutionary day, not in the Tories; in Chatham Burke and Sam Adams, not in Dr. Johnson or Lord North. I believe that the North star, abiding in its place is a greater influence in the universe than any comet or meteor. I believe that the United States, when William McKinley was inaugurated, was a greater world power than Rome in the height of her glory, or even England, with her 400,000,000 vassals. I believe whatever clouds may darken the horizon that the world is growing better; that today is better than yesterday, and tomorrow will be better than today."

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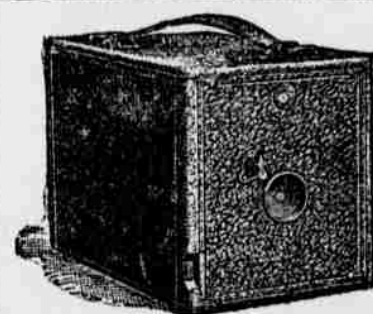

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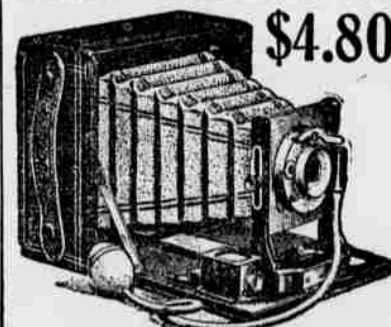
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
