The demand for more space at the Lewis and Clark Fair continues. High-headed easterners who expect this to be a little single-ring affair will be victims of a surprise party.

Dressed turkeys are 25 cents per pound in Portland, with prospects of a rise. However, the quality is said to be "better than ever," and that will in a measure counteract the legal-tender flavor.

Personal—Frank Baker, of whom a few Republicans and all leading Democrats in Oregon are insanely envious, will arrive tomorrow at his home in Portland from a visit to the National capital.

A Japanese fleet of 40 war vessels has started out to meet the more or less famous Russian Baltic fleet, and the greatest naval battle of the war is expected to occur within a few days. P. S.—So says a cablegram from Tokio.

The Russian government has placed orders for several thousand tons of American hay, as a hint that the war with Japan is far from ended. The combination will not be complete until Russia purchases several thousand Missouri mules.

A Portland "gentleman" was permitted to leave a hospital for a couple of hours last Sunday and visit his wife. The invalid husband gave his loving wife a good beating and returned to the hospital, much benefitted by the beautiful Sabbath day outing.

On the face of the returns the governor elect of Colorado is a Democrat. After he has been "duly inducted" into office he will be kept busy for awhile pardoning out of the penitentiary the prominent citizens who rounded up for him the necessary votes.

During the 11 months ending November 30 Portland held second place as a wheat-shipping port, Galveston being first and New Orleans third. Of the 12,219,173 bushels exported during this period 5,877,511 bushels went from Portland, Puget Sound and San Francisco.

In the near future a stream of oil will be started via the pipe line from the Indian Territory oil fields for the Standard Oil company's refineries in New York and New Jersey. Yes, gentle reader, the belief that this method of transportation will bring down the price of oil is only a pipe dream.
